
Local Authors at the Library

Join us for Forensic Pathology: A Local View on Tuesday, March 19 from 6:00pm to 7:00pm. Expert forensic pathologist Mary Jumbelic, M.D gives an in-depth presentation on the life of a medical examiner and the science of forensic pathology. Mary is also a local author and will read from her newly published book *Here, Where Death Delights*, a memoir with an overarching narrative about her journey to becoming a forensic pathologist and all the true crime that goes along with it. Her goal is to demystify death for herself, and others. There will be time for Q&A following the presentation!

On Monday, May 20 from 6:00pm to 7:00pm, join us for Writing Speculative Fiction, a presentation on the genre and one author's take on it. Speculative fiction is a genre of literature that encompasses works outside the realm of realism, combining elements of science fiction, fantasy, & horror - think Stephen King mixed with Kurt Vonnegut & Ray Bradbury. Local author Chris DelGuercio presents writing "spec-fic" with examples from his book of short stories, An Unsettled Score. There will be time for Q&A following the presentation, and signed copies of his book will be available for purchase.

Art in the Library

For the months of March & April, the **Community Library is featuring local** artist Lydia Benscher.

Artist's Statement:

Encaustic painting has been used by artists for thousands of years; the Fayum portraits from Coptic Egypt still exist today. It was at an exhibit of these paintings at the Royal Ontario Museum that I fell in love with this medium, and have worked with it ever since.

Encaustic paint is made of pigment, beeswax, and resin. Traditionally, encaustic paint is heated to apply it to a surface. It is rich in color and texture.

Artist's Bio:

Lydia Benscher studied at the Art Student's League of New York, Syracuse University, and received a Dual BA in History and Studio Art from Binghamton University. She has a studio at

the Delavan Center in Syracuse, New York, and continues working as an encaustic painter.

NEW! ESOL Bookpack Collection

Thanks to an Adult Literacy and Workforce Development Mini-Grant, the Community Library of DeWitt & Jamesville has added materials to our collection for **English Speakers of Other** Languages.

Known as Bookpacks, these items consist of a book by a popular adult author such as James Patterson, Nora Roberts, and Suzanne Collins, and an audio recording of the book. They require use of headphones, but do not need a CD player. The Bookpacks augment the packs already in the collection, children's chapter books. Adding age appropriate materials helps affirm the dignity of our adult English Learners.

These items help the Library provide quality service to area residents, meeting their educational and cultural needs. Listening to a text while reading along aids in the comprehension and acquisition of any new language. When the texts are interesting and read by area natives, this leads to discussion opportunities and a greater sense of community. The CLD&J is glad to support our English learners in their transition to live in Central New York.
